Lemony Almond-Feta Green Beans

- 1 pound fresh green beans, trimmed
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1 small onion, halved and sliced
- 3 garlic cloves, sliced
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds
- 1 tsp. grated lemon peel
- 3 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper

1/2 cup crumbled feta cheese



In a large saucepan, bring 4 cups water to a boil. Add green beans; cook, uncovered, for 4-5 minutes or until beans turn bright green. Remove beans and drop immediately into ice water. Drain and pat dry.

In a large skillet, heat butter over medium heat. Add onion; cook and stir 6-8 minutes or until tender. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer. Add green beans and almonds; cook and stir 3-4 minutes or until beans are crisp-tender. Sprinkle with lemon peel, lemon juice, salt and pepper; toss to combine. Top with cheese.

The other, Mickey, walks those same blocks on her police beat. They don't speak anymore, but Mickey never stops worrying about her sibling.

Then Kacey disappears, suddenly, at the same time that a mysterious string of murders begins in Mickey's district, and Mickey becomes dangerously obsessed with finding the culprit--and her sister--before it's too late.

Alternating its present-day mystery with the story of the sisters' childhood and adolescence, Long Bright River is at once heart-pounding and heartwrenching: a gripping suspense novel that is also a moving story of sisters, addiction, and the formidable ties that persist between place, family, and fate.


the family's youngest child going missing and a ghostly presence materializing in the basement. Something is terribly wrong with the house and with the visiting family or is Eve just imagining things?
